
# Fun with Toddlers: Farm Theme

<u>Milk a cow</u>. Take a latex glove. Fill with milk or water (like a water balloon) and tie it closed. Then use a pin to prick holes in the tips of the fingers. Show your child how to "milk" the water out of the "udder."
